'Wicked problems are complex and extremely hard to solve because of incomplete, contradictory and changing requirements. They usually:

- (1) involve multiple stakeholders whose values are different, sometimes even opposite,
- (2) lack definite formulation of the causes, and
- (3) have solutions that are not right or wrong but can be better or worse'. (Https://terra-institute.Eu/en/why-sustainable-issues-are-wicked-problems





'There is no recipe or set of protocols you can use to solve a wicked problem. A wicked problem has economic, social, and environmental dimensions that interact with one another in ways that are everchanging and unpredictable. As a result, many wicked problems are never completely solved. Instead, the best one can hope for is a process of continual improvement in addressing the issue' (Steve Schmida in Partner with a Purpose)

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AN OUTCOMES-BASED APPROACH

- ☐ ALL 4,842 water bodies need targeted measures to either protect or restore to good ecological status.
- ☐ Key performance indicators and milestones must be included for every water body to assess progress during 3rd cycle
- ☐ Timelines for achieving WFD status must be estimated
- ☐ Justification for water bodies not meeting WFD status by 2027 must be outlined
- ☐ Details should be included in the 46 catchment plans

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GOVERNANCE

- ☐ Full-time RBMP secretariat to manage implementation
- ☐ Transparency in decision-making, reviews and evaluation
- ☐ Structured engagement between the three tiers of governance
- Opportunities for the Forum to engage with the three tiers to allow stakeholder input into the implementation
- An interdepartmental financing strategy to support the implementation of measures (water, climate and biodiversity)

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PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

- ☐ A national approach for public participation to develop stakeholder visions and action plans for the 46 catchments
- ☐ A framework for local authorities and agencies to work together to support public participation for water, biodiversity and climate change
- Resources need to be put in place to develop and deliver the actions prioritised through public participation
- ☐ Pilot public participation approaches to inform the national approach

PRESSURES EXAMPLES



☐ AGRICULTURE - Independent Reviews of CAP and NAP to assess their ability to meet WFD objectives ☐ HYDROMORPHOLOGY - Development of a national framework and guidance for river restoration ☐ FORESTRY - Targeted measures to address the 233 waterbodies at risk from Forestry, along with interim timelines to indicate progress ☐ URBAN WASTEWATER - Actions to address the 208 waterbodies at risk from urban waste water

CONCLUDING REMARKS



Next 6 years critical but implementation and learning by doing key
Building trust through engagement and humility will help get us there
Transparent outcomes-based approach incorporating <u>ALL</u> water bodies is a crucial element – protect and improve principle
Resources for Implementation – building on last 6 years but gaps remain
Policy Coherence really important across water, climate and nature
Water Forum will continue to engage with Ministers, WPAC, UE,
CRU, DHPLG officials and others to advocate for its recommendations and actively contribute to implementation
